WORLD NEWS.

The oil tanker "MANUELA" which was diverted by the British Navy, has now left Durban with her oil cargo still aboard.

Buddhists in South Vietnam are reported to be in disagreement over their attitude to the military government.

The Indonesian Ambassador in Peking has resigned in protest against his government's policy towards China.

The South Arabian Federal Defence Minister has been injured in a bomb explosion.

The tanker "Manuela", which the British Navy diverted from the Portuguese East African port of ?--? has left Durban with her cargo of oil still aboard. Her destination is unknown, although Rotterdam has been mentioned as a possible one. She was last reported to be heading in a north-easterly direction, which, if continued would take her back into the Mozambique Channel where she was intercepted a week ago. It had been rumoured that "Manuela" might try to run the blockade by keeping to coastal territorial waters, but as Mr. Ian Smith has said that his regime in Rhodesia would not use the oil from the other ship which is still in the Portuguese East African port such an attempt would seem to be pointless.

In London, consultations on the latest developments over Rhodesia continue. The South African Ambassador called on Mr. Wilson at his own request and the British Ambassador to South Africa, now in London, had talks with the Foreign Secretary.

In South Vietnam, Buddhist demonstrators have again marched through the streets of Da Nang in protest against the military regime. They were defying a directive from the Buddhist leaders in Saigon, who had ordered an end to demonstrations because the government had agreed to elections within five months. During the rally, a speaker burned a copy of a government decree which promised the elections. The B.B.C. correspondent in Saigon said there is now a definite rift between the Buddhist leaders and some of their followers in Central Vietnam, and several leaders are expected to go to Da Nang in an attempt to remedy this.

On the War Front, American Marines fought a two hour battle with Vietcong guerrillas who launched a dawn attack near Da Nang. The Vietcong withdrew after fierce fighting, including hand-to-hand encounters. American planes have attacked lorry convoys in North Vietnam, and a heavily fortified Vietcong area near Saigon, believed to have been the base for Wednesday's mortar attack on Saigon airport.

The Indonesian Ambassador in Peking has resigned in protest against his government's attitude to China. He told a News conference in Peking that in the past few months, since the Army virtually took over, Indonesian policy has shifted far to the Right, and relations between the two countries have got steadily worse. He said this was because an anti-Chinese campaign had been whipped up in Indonesia

culminating in the storming of the Chinese Embassy by what he called "reactionary bands".

West Germany, Britain, and the United States have agreed to set up a high-level working group to coordinate their action in the light of France's impending withdrawal from the integrated command of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation. This was announced at the end of two days of talks in Bonn between representatives of the three countries. The discussions also covered the practical, legal, and military aspects arising from France's decision to withdraw her forces in Germany from NATO command.

The South Arabian Federal Defence Minister was injured by a bomb explosion while travelling by car in Aden. The Minister has undergone an operation for a broken leg, but his condition is not serious. Three other people in the car were slightly injured.

A document purported to be transcript of part of the recent trial of two Soviet writers in Moscow is being circulated in the West. The document shows that the accused, who received sentences of five to seven years on charges of publishing anti-Soviet books abroad, defended themselves with great vigour. One of them is quoted as saying "It did not matter much logically they argued, the judges were not prepared to listen. The trial was political, and so was the verdict.

The Russians have announced that their moon satellite has shown that radiation on the moon should be no obstacle to manned flights. The President of the Soviet Academy of Sciences said it would continue to orbit the moon for several years. It has no cameras on board, but it will be possible to put a satellite with cameras into a similar orbit.

The captain of a Russian submarine which sailed around the world completely submerged, has told of meeting an American submarine underwater during the marathon voyage. He said in "Izvestia" that the encounter demonstrated the need for underwater sailing rules and signals for submarines. He said his instruments focussed on the American submarine for ninety minutes as it drew closer, until the Soviet Duty Officer finally reported "The American is deviating to the left".

Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, who is on an eighteen day visit to New Zealand, was greeted by cheering crowds when she arrived at Invercargill in the South Island today to unveil a memorial plaque. Later she boarded the Royal yacht "Britannia" for her journey to Dunedin.

The World Heavyweight boxing champion, Cassius Clay, has agreed to defend his title against the British and Empire champion, Henry Cooper, in London next month. Contracts have not yet been signed, but the London promoter Harry Levine said they will meet at the Arsenal football ground on May 21st or 28th. It will be the first World Heavyweight title fight in London for over 50 years.

New Zealand troops are to be sent to Fiji later this year to train under tropical conditions. The New Zealand Defence Minister said in Wellington that the training would help the army to meet its defence commitments in Malaysia and Vietnam.

Hundreds of thousands of people lined the streets of Baghdad today to watch the funeral procession of President Arif of Iraq, who was killed in a helicopter crash earlier this week. Most Arab states sent representatives to the funeral, but the B.B.C. Middle East correspondent said a notable exception was Syria.

NATURE PAGE.

There are few creatures that can endure the Antarctic Winters. The major ones are Whales, Seals and Penguins. There is however, another less well-known mammal which spends its winters in the Antarctic, the "Fiddus Weddellus" more commonly known as the FID.

FIDs have many variations in the colour of their plumage, ranging from, green, orange and grey with various permutations of all three colours, sometimes extending over the skull, and on rare occasions the head is an entirely different colour; the face is covered with a furry growth covering up a pale pinkish skin. There are two types of FIDs; the "Minimus" and "Maximus", the only difference is that one works and the other does not work. The FID is the only animal to actually live on the ice shelf away from the sea and does not derive its living from the sea. These FIDs live in small colonies on the Graham Land coast a few isolated Islands, and on the Ice Shelf off Coats Land. The colony on the Ice Shelf off Coats Land has a small settlement at Halley Bay, where research for this article was carried out.

FIDs are not born in the Antarctic but arrive in the summer season in large floating vessels: the reactions of the FIDs who have spent a year or two in the Antarctic can be likened to the Peacock in the mating season: while the new FIDs act in a similar fashion in their anxiety to get off their large floating vessel. The habitation of these FIDs appears to be large buildings which sink into the snow as soon as they are erected: and almost the only time FIDs appear above the snow surface is when they appear to be digging their nests out or filling them in. The colony consists entirely of a male species. As there must be females of this species, they must inhabit lands in warmer climates where it is possible that they mate and reproduce. FIDs appear to be nocturnal animals and they prefer to lie in their nests or "pits" throughout the morning, and it is not until the evening that they stir into life. This is not the case of them all however, the King Fid or the B.L. will arise early and attempt to rouse the others: four or five will arise and pay homage to their god by releasing a balloon up to the heavens; others will grunt back at the B.L. and go on sleeping.

Other members of this colony travel away in large red boxes and are not seen for a considerable time: if there are none of these red boxes available, they travel away on a wooden vehicle being dragged by dogs. They apparently change places with the dogs after about half a mile or so. This apparent expulsion may be a form of punishment as on their return they are immersed in warm water, this is known as a bath.

To sum up: the FIDs appear to be docile, although there are occasions when they are in "munk" and don't appear to appreciate their companions. They are always anxious about happenings in lower latitudes and keep repeating this saying; "Roll on that little red ship"

FROM MY CASEBOOK, by DR. SIGMUND FROOD.

The psychoanalysis of neurotics can very often lead to some very startling results. A case I attended this week may serve to illustrate this point.

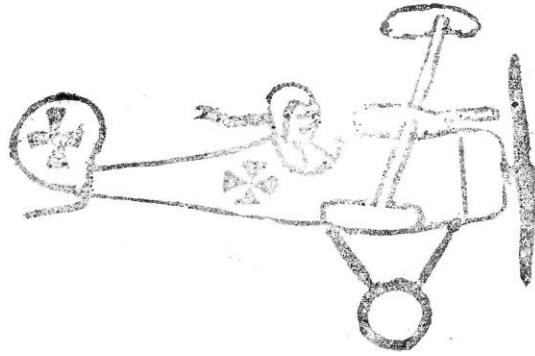
