THE UNITED STATES IS INTENSIFYING THE AIR WAR IN VIETNAM.

300 INDONESIAN AIR FORCE OFFICERS HAVE BEEN ARRESTED.

ITALY AND THE SOVIET UNION ARE TO EXCHANGE SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL INFORMATION.

ROUMANIA AND YUGOSLAVIA SAY THEY WILL TRY TO DEVELOP CO-OPERATION BETWEEN THE BALKAN STATES.

The cost of copper from Zambia is to rise sharply. The Zambian mines have abandoned fixed prices, and are now selling at free market rates on the London Metal Exchange. At present, these are nearly double the old Zambian rates. The B.B.C. Economic Reporter says that with more copper being offered on the London Exchange the price is almost certain to come down. The Zambian producers' decision follows the recent price increase announced by Chile, another of the world's leading copper producers. The reporter says that the cost of copper has rocketed because of the Vietnam war, and because of strikes at the copper mines in both Zambia and Chile.

The United States is stepping up its air war in Vietnam. The B.B.C. Air Correspondent, now in Saigon, says that heavy bombers are making mass raids almost daily, and the toll of American aircraft losses is mounting. Altogether, according to an American spokesman, about 300 planes have been lost in the war so far. Vietcong guerrillas have made another attack, the second in twenty-four hours, on a police post in Saigon. They opened fire with machine guns and threw grenades, wounding at least two Vietnamese policemen, and three civilians. President Johnson has said that there is so far no indication that the communists are prepared to call a halt to their aggression in WXXXXX Vietnam. He told a news conference in Washington that all American peace moves had been brushed aside. He added that he was sure that eventually constitutional government would be established in South Vietnam. More than 40 South Vietnamese political and religious leaders are at present meeting in Saigonto set up a committee to draft laws for the election of a civilian government.

The MIndonesian Air Force has announced that more than 300 of its officers have been arrested on charges of taking part in last October's unsuccessful coup.Correspondents say it is the first purge against pro-Communist elements in the Air Borce since the attempted coup.

Italy and the Soviet Union have signed an agreement to exchange scientific and technical information to promote industrial progress

in their two countries. The Agreement was signed in Rome bt the Soviet Foreign Minister, Mr. Gromyko, and his Italian opposite number XXXXXX at the end of three days of talks.Mr. Gromyko is staying on in Italy privatly until next Wednesday, and the B.B.C. Rome Correspondent says that speculation continues as to whether he will seek an audience with the Pôpe.

Six East European countries have followed the lead of the Soviet Union in adopting the French SECAM colour television system. Earlier this month France and the Soviet Union signed an agreement for the joint use of the French system, and the Russians say they will support it when European countries meet in Oslo this summer to choose a common system for the whole continent. Britain and West Germany have already expressed their preference for the West GermanPAL system.

Yugoslavia and Roumania say they will make every effort to develop co-operation and understanding among the Balkan States. A communique issued at the end of President Tito's visit to Bucharest also says that each Communist party has the absolute right to decide its own political line without interference from others.

In Peking it has been announced that the Albanian Prime Minister will shortly head a delegation on an official visit to China. China and Albania are allies in their ideological dispute with the Soviet Union.

The Pavilion at the British Commercial Exhibition in Oslo, which has been destroyed by fire, is to be replaced by a temporary structure. The Pavilion, designed as a "shop window" for the City of London, was to have been used for the opening of the British Fortnight next Friday. The cause of the fire has not yet been established, but one report says that it was an electrical short circuit.

In Finland 29 patients were burnt to death in a fire at a mental hospital. The matron said that a woman patient who was admitted yesterday was a pyromaniac.

A Japanese Trade Ministry spokesman has sais that Japan has been co-operating fully with Britain in applying economic sanctions against Rhodesia. He was referring to the recent British statement that continual representations are being made to all countries, including Japan, about imports from Rhodesia. It is understood in London that Japan is still importing Rhodesian iron ore, chrome, and asbestos.

The authorities in Zanzibar have expelled an Anglican assistant bishop who has spent some thirty years on the island, the Right.

Reverend Robert Russell. When he arrived on the Tanzanian mainland, the Bishop said that he had no idea why he had been asked to leave. He added that the order was issued by the local authorities, not by the Tanzanian government in Dar-es-Salam.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Ramsay, who is on a pilgrimage in the Holy Land, has called on Roman Catholic, Armenian, and Franciscan leaders in Jerusalem. He also went to Samaria, north of the city, where he wask a guest of the Arab clergy.

At Christchurch thousands of people greeted the arrival of Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother, who is continuing her tour of New Zealand. She will begin her visit to North Island on Monday, starting at Well --ington.

Britain's Deputy Prime Minister, Mr. George Brown, now in a London hospital, is said to be "responding satisfactorily" to treatment. An announcement yesterday said Mr. Brown was in hospital for observation as he had been unwell for the previous two days.

RUGBY LEAGUE: Challenge Cup Semi-Final WIGAN 7 LEEDS 2 LAWM TENNIS : Mrs. Ann Jones confirmed that she still reigns supreme among Britain's women when she won the British Hard Court title for the fourth time in succession. In an all-British final she beat Virginia Wade in straight sets to equal the record set up by the American Doris Hart, who also won the title four times running in the early 1950's. This year's men's title went to the Australian top seed, Ken Fletcher.

RACING : At Sandown Park, where the going was heavy, the $3\frac{1}{2}$ mile handicap 'chase for the Whitbread Gold Cup was won by the 5 to 4 favourite "Watamyth". Experts were of the opinion that the Irish horse "Arkle" could have run without harm in the going, and on form he would have won comfortably. Dormant (100 - 7) was second.

The Olympic Organisation appears to have avoided a possible clash within its own ranks over who should choose the venue for the Games. The usual procedure is for the International Olympic Committee to vote on the matter, but this week the International Federations, representing the 21 sports of the games (which normally just makes

Lovegrove (late of "The Pyramids, Tottan Row) as chairman welcomed the party from the bottom of his wheelchair, including Amanda Reed (hairstyle demonstrator), Phillip Cotterill (chairman of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Disabled Persons), Mr. D. Stokes (creator of the Cleopatra Crutchpiece), Mr. Andy Williams (well-known translator on religious programmes for the Disabled), also Mr. S.Swift, representing the Southern Gas Board, and finally a large contingent from the Disabled Apprentices' School for Whites.

After a magnificent (-soft-diet-)dinner, Mr. Lovegrove thanked the Disabled Catering Corps, which was by then secured in its shackles once more, frothing with content, and appraised the Roman appearance and dress of the guests - happy to see that they were not afraid to show what they hadn't got. After a short vomit, Mr. L. went on to congratulate Mr. Keyte, and to wish him a very happy birthday, to which the guests echoed their agreement. Mr. Keyte had trouble in standing, but despite difficulties in speech thanked everyone for their good-will and good wishes, and then fainted.

The guests were then led into the private lounge of the hotel, where they were amused by the antics of Stump-man T. Wilson and his partner for the evening Colleen Wornemdown. "After the war," continues our hero, "I decided that the drab monotony of civilian life held nothing for me...Except jail sentence for joining the wrong side...... I met lots of interesting people there too, English Gentry like myself all mad keen to return their white feathers etc..... Splendid chaps!"

"When the wogs started shooting back I decided it was time to leave. However our sergeant had become so attached to me that he was reluctant to let me go. "Well.... er....no.... the exact term used, was "Europes most WANTED man" but it is difficult to exactly translate these foreign terms of affection."

ARCHAEOLOGICAL NEWS.

Several expeditions have travelled to the waste-lands of the Antarctic, and until very recently it was thought that one of the first men ever to cross the Antarctic Circle was Captain Cook in the eighteenth century; and that land was first sighted by Lieut. Edward Bransfield im eighteen twenty; but recent archæological surveys have proved that in fact this was not the case.

Antarctic waste-lands were in fact a wild tribe of Ancient Britons. These have left evidence of their stay in the shape of an ancient and rather vicious looking club together with a spear, shield and other relics; this tribe does not appear to have been very large in numbers and was apparently soon overrun by Romans. These Romans appear to have used slaves including galley slaves; whose chains have been discovered.

Although many thousands of miles away from their native lands they still inflicted the severe punishments of their era: a large cross was found bearing a sign which when interpreted meant "Care of J.C. & Co, Ltd." This helps clarify the age in which these peoples came to the Antarctic; between 33 A.D. and 1966 A.D. which proves nothing. Several bones were in evidence which has led to the assumption that they ate food, (on second thoughts they must have) and that they ate in large communal gatherings with servants to waits upon them.

The severe winters do not appear to have affected their dress from that of the warm climates of their own homeland; a cloak was found which was of a thinner material than any other known cloaks of that period; armour was made of a lighter material but seemed as effective in fact on a closer examination of the swords that were used in that time armour might not have been necessary at all. Togas were worn by the Nobles of the cummunity and a laurel wreath was also found. Amongst the clothes that were found, there was an outfit large enough to fit a giant; these clothes were examined and it was found that the materials used in them were indestructable; obviously a Roman Superman.

Their habitation had "Greco-Roman" columns supporting the roof; two had recesses in them in which were placed busts (carved heads, you twit, not what you were thinking) of Julius Cæsar and Brutus. Further adornment consisted of a few weird signs in Latin, which were obviously put there in more recent times as drawing pins were used.

Further excavation may prove to be impossible due to the Scientific observatory and News paper office which have been built over the old site.
